Heidi Hays

- a. Great Blue Heron (*Ardea herodias*)—mainly fish, but also other aquatic animals like frogs, reptiles, insects, small birds and mammals
- b. Anna's Hummingbird (*Calypte anna*)—nectar from flowers, small insects
- c. Long-billed Curlew (*Numenius americanus*)—shrimp, crabs, worms, and insects in soft muddy beach sand
- d. White-winged Crossbill (*Loxia leucoptera*)—seeds from cones of spruce and tamarack trees
- e. Brown Creeper (*Certhia americana*)—insects and their larvae, spiders and their eggs in tree trunks and branches
- f. Pileated Woodpecker (*Dryocopus pileatus*)—ants, beetle larvae, and other insects living under tree bark
- g. Northern Shoveler (*Spatula clypeata*)—seeds of aquatic plants, small mollusks and crustaceans, insects and their larvae, zooplankton
- h. Red-tailed Hawk (*Buteo jamaicensis*)—small rodents like mice and voles, rabbits, ground-dwelling birds like pheasants, snakes
